## MELTON LOCAL DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK CORE STRATEGY: SUBMISSION

### COMMENTS OF LDF WORKING GROUP, 3<sup>RD</sup> SEPTEMBER 2012

The Working Group met on 3<sup>rd</sup> September 2012. It considered the same papers as being presented to the Full Council meeting, in particular the Focussed Changes set out in Appendix 2.
