Introduction

Melton Borough is changing. Over the coming years we will see significant growth in our town and the wider reaches of our Borough, bringing in new employment and business opportunities.

We have to recognise that in order to thrive in an increasingly competitive economy we need to meet future business needs and we will do this by working jointly with our partners. Whilst we wish to retain and sustain the major national companies based locally, we are keen to promote new, smaller knowledge-based entrepreneurship.

Melton's Economic Growth Plan focuses on four strategic priority areas with the aim of establishing a clear competitive advantage for the Borough, so that we maximise the opportunities to deliver economic and social growth. These priorities are promoting innovation and enterprise; enhancing aspirations, skills and creating economic activity; improving the vitality of the Borough's town and villages and maximising inward investment and tourism.

Strengths and Challenges

Melton's Economic Growth Plan is built on sound evidence. Melton Borough Council has recently formulated an Economic Development Strategy (2012-2015), which outlines our vision to 'enhance the quality of life for everyone in the Borough of Melton to achieve a sustainable, prosperous and vibrant community...a place people want to live, work and visit'.

Melton Borough Council has also commissioned e-commerce Place Profiles for Melton. Place Profile reports provide high-level analysis of an area, telling a 'story of place' and an overall assessment of economic, social and environmental conditions. Each profile sets an area within its wider context, comparing performance with neighbouring areas, as well as regional and national averages.


Labour and Market Employment

Strong economic foundations are critical to the future success of an area, creating quality employment opportunities for local people. Economic growth is assessed by an area's change in total employment, giving an indication of the growth and decline of the local economy.

Compared to other Districts in Leicestershire, Melton has the smallest economy and related to this, the fewest local jobs. Despite this, it is a relatively prosperous rural area with lower levels of social deprivation and unemployment than many areas.

In Melton there are 26,400 residents in employment, of which 7,100 are in self-employment, making it one of the highest levels in the Country (April 2012-March 2013, NOMIS).

The map shows the performance of districts within Leicestershire on the Local Future's Labour Market Score. The areas with very dark shading score highly and those with very light shading score poorly in terms of employment rates.




With a score of 111.88, Melton is in the top 20% of districts and is in the sub region that is in the middle 20% of sub regions nationally for employment levels.

Education and Skills

Human capital is a prerequisite of a successful knowledge economy. The resident workforce should ideally be characterised by a good blend of academic and vocational skills.

The proportion of the working age resident population qualified to NVQ level 4 and above in Melton is high by national standards, with 35.58% of all residents qualified to this level in 2012. By comparison, the Leicestershire figure was 29.63%, the East Midlands figure was 28.37% and the national figure was 34.38%.

The map below shows the performance of districts within Leicestershire on our skills and qualifications score. The areas with very dark shading score highly and those with very light shading score poorly.



With a skills and qualifications score of 99.81, Melton is around the national median. This is shown in the map, where areas with very dark shadings score highly and those with very

light shadings score poorly. In light of this evidence, Melton Borough Council is keen to ensure we support local businesses to up-skill their employees and we plan on achieving this by a number of means.


Competitiveness

A dynamic local enterprise culture is vital for the long-term competitiveness and overall success of any economy. The Local Futures Business and Enterprise Score assesses the extent of an enterprise culture in Melton. The score is composed of the new business formation rate, the business survival rate and the growth in business stock in the last 5 years.

Melton benefits from its geographical location and good road networks with links to other major economic centres including Leicester, Birmingham, Nottingham and Peterborough.

Melton brand has also increased its competitiveness in the tourism market '*The Rural Capital of Food and Drink*', famous for Melton Mowbray Pork Pies and Stilton Cheese.

The map below shows the performance of districts within Leicestershire on our business and enterprise score. The areas with very dark shading score highly and those with very light shading score poorly.



With a score of 98.53, Melton is in the middle 20% of districts and is in the sub region (Leicestershire) that is in the bottom 40% of sub regions nationally.

Strategic Priorities

We have identified four strategic priorities for economic growth over the next two years. These are:

Promoting Innovation and Enterprise: to develop a strong competitive economy by encouraging emerging technologies and innovation.

Innovation is a major driver of economic growth by increasing productivity, opening up new markets and creating new goods and services that can be used by the rest of the economy.

Enhancing Aspirations, Skills and Creating Economic Activity: to develop a work force to meet the needs of the local marketplace and raise ambition.

The skills and abilities of our workforce are vital to our aspirations of a thriving knowledgebased, high value-added economy. We need to ensure that young people in particular gain the necessary knowledge and competence to drive forward innovation and enterprise. The local economy and businesses within it require well-qualified, enthusiastic employees with the right attitude, in order to compete and boost productivity. Education providers need to focus on future skills requirements locally and nationally.

Improving the Vitality of the Borough's Town and Villages: to create better places for local employment, shopping and entertainment.

Melton Mowbray is the main service and employment centre, with the local economy traditionally focusing on farming and associated food products. During recent years, Melton Mowbray has sustained a high level of business confidence, customer satisfaction and levels of footfall. We are also committed to protecting the rural economy, so that the local countryside can support living, working, sustainable communities.

Maximising Inward Investment and Tourism: to work with other agencies to maximise resources and promote a competitive economy.

Over the last 50 years the Borough has developed into a growing manufacturing and service economy with an international reputation for local food products, such as Stilton Cheese and Melton Mowbray Pork Pies, contributing to the brand image of 'Rural Capital of Food and Drink'. Melton Borough Council also has a good track record in securing external funds and attracting inward investment and we will continue to develop projects that will deliver outcomes that meet the economic and social needs of the Borough.

Inward Investment

Melton Borough Council has examined the performance of Melton, both in terms of its attractiveness to inward investors and businesses considering re-location. As part of this process, five measures of economic performance have been taken into account in order to assess Melton's current economic performance.

The Inward Investment report examines the performance of Melton, in terms of its attractiveness to inward investors and businesses considering location. The findings are organised in three main categories:

- Economic Performance
- Human Resources
- Environment & Infrastructure

The report has identified a number of key findings when compared to the sub-regional and national figures, some of which include:

- Overall levels of productivity in Melton are average
- The knowledge-driver business score is very low
- The business and enterprise score in Melton is average.
- Skills and qualification score is average
- Labour market score is very high
- Connectivity in Melton is very low
- Quality of life score is average
- Total stock of commercial & Industrial floor space is very low

Project 5: Commercial and Industrial Floorspace Study

Whilst there are a number of existing sites, including Saxby Road Industrial Estate, Snowhill Industrial Estate, Old Dalby Business Park and Crown Business Park and further sites being developed i.e. Westleigh Industrial Estate and the Rotherhill Development, business feedback is clear that there is a requirement for more and modern premises. Melton Borough Council must also consider upgrading existing businesses premises to ensure that they are fit for purpose.
