Background	The Sustainable Warmth Competition is a single application for the third phase of Local Authority Delivery (LAD) as well as the new Home Upgrade Grant (HUG). Only local authorities or Local Energy Hubs can apply for the Sustainable Warmth Competition, which aims to distribute funding for councils to improve domestic energy efficiency for fuel poor households. This project will be <b>focused on private sector housing.</b>

The latest phase of the funding was launched on 16th June as a competition. The MEH are planning to submit a regional bid for the Sustainable Warmth Competition to access funding (£350m available across England) as part of Phase 3 of the LAD and HUG (Home Upgrade Grant) which will to run from January 2022 to March 2023. A regional submission is being submitted by the Midlands Energy Hub as the Lead Authority offers an opportunity for all LA's in the region to access funding to support thousands of fuel poor households.

The current delivery model developed and implemented through Phase 2 offers an effective route for the delivery of LAD3 and HUG1 across the Midlands.

Planned delivery for the Sustainable Warmth Competition is intended to mirror and build on Phase 2. The allocation is calculated to reflect the number and proportion of EPC Band E, F and G properties within a Local Authority, following the same process of Phase 2.

To support LAD phase 3, MEH intend to continue with the services procured for LAD2 to assist with the customer journey and implementation. The service support local authorities and inform citizens of the process as well as providing a single point of contact and support. The service will check household eligibility, answer questions on the scheme and energy efficiency measures, register any complaints as well as provide additional support to help tackle fuel poverty i.e. income maximisation and tariff switching.

By 30<sup>th</sup> July we need to:

- Acknowledge our support for the regional bid and confirm our interest in the allocation below (table 1).
- State if we have capacity to deliver additional measures within the timeframes we do not have additional capacity.
- Inform MEH if we are intending to submit our own bid to BEIS we do not intend to.

## Reason for Decision/Main Considerations

The Midlands Energy Hub (MEH) is planning to submit a regional bid for the Sustainable Warmth Competition to access funding as part of Phase 3 of the Local Authority Delivery (LAD) and HUG (Home Upgrade Grant) which will run from January 2022 to March 2023.

Notice of intention for MEH to bid was received on 20 July 2021 and deadline given to acknowledge, support and confirm interest is 30 July 2021 which provides insufficient time to provide notice.
