Decision	 To note that payments shall be delivered to businesses as per the attachment (at Appendix A) in accordance within the approved Discretionary Grant Fund Scheme Policy To note that the Director for Growth and Regeneration will use her delegated authority in consultation to the Portfolio Holder for Growth and Prosperity to update the Procedural notes to include businesses not originally given priority under the first round of this scheme 	
Reason for Decision	 The Council has been allocated up to £575,000 form Central Government through the Local Authority Discretionary grant fund to support those businesses that have been impacted by the coronavirus pandemic. Following the launch of the scheme on the 27th May for a 2 week period till the 10th June 143 applications have been received. These applications have been assessed and the details 	

	of the Local Authority discretionary grant fund policy and procedural notes applied to inform the grant amount allocated. As identified in Appendix 1 These amounts have been agreed by a grant panel consisting of 3 officers from the Local Authority. The grant allocations conform with all expectations as laid out in the associated government guidance. A total of circa £457,000 has been allocated through this round with approximately £118,000 still left to be allocated. Due to this the Council has taken the decision to open up for a second round of funding for those businesses who were not originally prioritised in the first round of the scheme
Alternative options rejected	Do nothing – this was rejected as this would have meant that the £575k allocation would remain unspent and many businesses in need of support within the Melton Borough area would not have been able to receive it. Allocate all funding through the first round – this was rejected as it was felt by the grant panel that of the applications received the amount of funding allocated was a fair and proportionate and in adherence with the associated policy and procedural note. It was also acknowledged that there are still many businesses in Melton who are in need or support through these tough times so opening a second round of the scheme targeted at those who have been unable to access grant support so far would be of benefit to the local economy
Legal implications	The Council has the power to award grants to organisations using its general power of competence in section 1 of the Localism Act 2011. In exercising the power the Council must satisfy its public law duties. In essence this means that in making the decision the Council must have taken into account only relevant considerations, followed procedural requirements, acted for proper motives and not acted unreasonably.

Financial implications	The Council will need to ensure the eligibility criteria is formulated, applied and met consistently to all grants in line with Government Guidance. Taking decisions outside of Policy/Guidance may result in financial implications for the Council. The Government has allocated Melton Borough Council as total sum of £575,000 to provide business support as part of a local authority discretionary scheme.			
	Based on the policy in App A, a total of circa £457,000 has been allocated through this round with approximately £118,000 still left to be allocated.			this round
	The council still has money remaining from the £11.7m government grant scheme for business support and will use this money initially to fund this scheme in accordance with government guidance. Therefore, there are no cash flow implications associated with making these payments.			
	There is the risk of clawback by the government if the national criteria is not met or in instances of fraud if appropriate due diligence is not undertaken. To mitigate this a number of checks have been undertaken to ensure eligibility and also internal audit are supporting on meeting the governments assurance criteria.
